Dear Friends of Marion and RTC Supporters,

Thank you for your support, prayers and friendship that has allowed Marion to continue to serve among the Cambodian people and bring employment and hope to many of the locals whom she also calls 'family'.

Production work continues at the present factory with the harvesting of 25 tons of mangoes, so far this year which gives us large stock for sales in the coming months. The capability to continue export to Japan, but now to Singapore and a trial stock to Australia is a small but vital step forward that we hope to develop and sustain. We have come to the realisation that, in order to get the factory to become 'self-sustaining' we need to look at exporting to other countries, since the profit margin of sales within Cambodia is still small. This ability to export has been a major battle fought and won in the spiritual realm, with the intercessory prayers of many of you that are reading this letter. Thank you.



While continuing with productions and sales from the present factory, we have also been able to build a boundary wall around the mango-farm. You will remember that every monsoon, the floods devastate much of Cambodia and the farm had up to a meter of flood water last year and we lost our pineapple crop. This boundary wall, with deep foundations will help protect the farm for the upcoming monsoons. We are also looking at building two staff houses on the farm that will house the farmer and his family, and to also be able to hold church services in the other. We've presently been quoted around \$20, 000 for building both houses.

The church is growing with eight baptisms in the last month and answers to prayers for healing and other miracles. God is adding to our numbers regularly with testimonies of miraculous healings and other miracles. It is said that there are still six million land-mines hidden within the Cambodian territory, and recently a group of farmers were wounded when they unknowingly lit their fire for cooking food, on a potato farm, but over a landmine. Two of our staff visited the wounded regularly in hospital and with prayer, recovery for them was miraculously speedy. Since most of the staff with RTC are themselves landmine survivors, it touched a soft chord in many hearts. For Bunthoeun Cheng, this was a vulnerable time bringing back some past painful memories of his own suffering, but he has now willingly been commissioned to the role of a Hospital Chaplain, using his own testimony of suffering and redemption.



We are delighted to share these stories of progress and redemption with you. Thank you for your support over the many years.
